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Minutes of October 5, 2020 Gamma Eta Chapter

Special guest for the evening was Judy Evans, Area 12 Coordinator. Judy brought greetings from the Texas State Organization President Patti Belknap. She reminded us of the theme for this biennium is "You are the Key" and that each member has the ability to unlock many doors. Judy complimented Gamma Eta on their attendance at Area Workshop. Gamma Eta had 10 members present and 6 members with some part in the program.

A list of upcoming dates was shared by Judy. Saturday, December 5, 2020 will be the Christmas Brunch with Alpha Sigma being the host. Leadership Seminar applications are due October 15, 2020. November 1, 2020 is the deadline for STAR registration, Early Bird Yearbook and Fall Mini Grants.

AC Judy Evans then installed the 2020-2022 officers: Terri Egerton, President; K Dee Anderson, First Vice President; Tiffany Harkins, Second Vice President; Jean Williams, Corresponding Secretary; Janie Wigley, Recording Secretary; Sharon McDougle, Treasurer; and Donna Anderson, Parliamentarian.

President Terri Egerton called the business meeting to order. Minutes from the May ZOOM meeting were ready by Janie Wigley. Debbi Ball made a motion to approve the minutes as read; Donna Anderson seconded the motion. Minutes were approved. Sharon McDougle, Treasurer, presented the 2020-2021 budget. Janie Wigley made a motion to approve the 2020-21 budget; Rhea Melton seconded the motion. The budget was approved.

Debbi Ball gave an update on the Goggle Project. The end of year report deadline has been extended to June 30, 2021. Debbi is going to make contact with superintendents and encourage schools to resume using the goggles as soon as they can safely do so. K Dee Anderson gave a report on programs. She indicated that ZOOM will be an option for each meeting this year with our January 11, 2021 meeting being by ZOOM only. Tiffany Harkins shared that the Gamma Eta Yearbook is in the editing stage. She is needing a few program summaries to be submitted to her so she can finish up the yearbook as the Early Bird deadline is November 1, 2020.

Donna Anderson stated that we are in compliance with electronic meetings and voting as far as our chapter bylaws are concerned. Articles XII, XIII and XIV all contain wording to allow us to meet and vote electronically. Jean Williams has turned the "Brags for Grants" bucket over to Sharon McDougle. Many wonderful brags were voiced.

Debbi Ball and Janie Wigley shared about ASTEF. ASTEF is looking for new board members with the deadline for that application being April 15, 2021. Debbi emphasized how ASTEF has helped Gamma Eta over the past several years with stipends to help with our projects. She had a show of hands of members who had attended the Leadership Seminar and encouraged others to apply. Scholarships were also recognized with several members having received scholarships in past years.

Tiffany Harkins presented Donna Anderson with the Gamma Eta Angel.

Meeting was adjourned after Perfect Pin, Perfect Attendance and Double Perfect awards were given out.


